The Stonewall Kinsmen & Kinettes



For generations, the Stonewall Kinsmen and Kinette Clubs have embodied what it truly means to serve your community. Now celebrating 78 years since receiving their charter in 1947, the Clubs stand proudly as pillars of local support, leadership, and hometown spirit. Founded on values of volunteerism, compassion, and pride in where we live, these community service clubs have been quietly shaping Stonewall since the mid-1950s—creating lasting spaces, supporting families in need, and leading projects that continue to bring people together. Their mission is simple yet powerful: "Serving the community's greatest needs." But in Stonewall, they've done much more than that—they've helped build the very places where memories are made.

One of their most visible and enduring contributions came in 1956, when the Stonewall Kinsmen transformed part of the historic quarry into what we now know as Kinsmen Lake. When it officially opened on August 10, 1956, it became a gathering place for families to swim, picnic, and enjoy summer sunsets—a tradition that lives on today. More recently, the Kinsmen and Kinettes gifted the Kinsmen Splash Pad at Quarry Park, creating another space where laughter, community, and childhood joy come to life. Their generosity also extends to essential services, including funding medical equipment for the Stonewall Hospital, supporting the local food bank, and contributing to vital community initiatives.

Their fundraising efforts are not just events—they are traditions. From the annual Christmas Tree Sale, which fuels projects for the following year, to the Smile Cookie Campaign, Feed the Need food drives, and the beloved Breakfast with Santa for children (December 6th at the Legion), each initiative reflects the kindness and commitment of volunteers who believe that everyone deserves support, especially during the holidays. Whether it's helping fill empty plates, providing warmth through winter, or creating safe spaces for children to play, the Kinsmen and Kinettes continue to lead with heart.

This holiday season, as we gather at home and celebrate the meaning of community, we are reminded that Stonewall is made stronger by people who show up for others. To the Kinsmen and Kinettes—thank you for your 78 years of dedication, your decades of service, and for helping make Stonewall not just a town, but a place where everyone truly belongs.

Gingerbread Cookies

Ingredients

- 3 cups flour
- ¾ cup brown sugar
- ¾ cup molasses
- 1 tbsp ginger, 1 tsp cinnamon, ½ tsp cloves
- 1 tsp baking soda

Directions

Mix dry ingredients, stir in wet, chill dough for 30 minutes, roll and cut into shapes, bake at 350°F for 8–10 minutes.

Mulled Wine

Ingredients

- 1 bottle red wine
- ¼ cup honey or sugar
- 1 orange (sliced)
- 4 cloves, 2 cinnamon sticks, star anise

Directions

Combine in a pot, simmer gently for 15–20 minutes (do not boil). Serve warm with orange slices.

Classic Roast Turkey

Ingredients

- 1 whole turkey (10– 12 lbs)
- ½ cup butter
- Salt, pepper, herbs
- 1 onion + 1 lemon (quartered)

Directions

Rub butter under the skin, season generously, stuff cavity, roast at 325°F for 3–4 hours or until internal temp reaches 165°F. Let rest before carving.

Shortbread

Ingredients

- 1 cup unsalted butter, softened
- ½ cup icing sugar
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- ¼ cup cornstarch
- ½ tsp vanilla extract (optional)

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 325°F (160°C).
- 2. Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy.
- 3. Sift in flour and cornstarch; mix until dough forms.
- 4. Press dough into an ungreased 8x8-inch pan or roll out and cut into shapes.
- 5. Prick tops with a fork and bake for 20–25 minutes, or until edges are pale golden.
- 6. Cool slightly before cutting into squares.



Apple Crisp

Ingredients

- 6 cups sliced apples (about 5–6 medium)
- ½ cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tbsp lemon juice

Topping

- ¾ cup rolled oats
- ½ cup flour
- ½ cup brown sugar
- ½ tsp cinnamon
- 1/3 cup butter, melted

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F (175°C).
- 2. Combine filling ingredients in a bowl and pour into a greased 8x8-inch baking dish.
- 3. Mix topping ingredients and sprinkle evenly over apples.
- 4. Bake 35–40 minutes until topping is golden and filling is bubbling.
- 5. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream.

Classic Roast Beef

Ingredients

- 1 (4–5 lb) beef roast (sirloin tip or rib roast)
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tbsp kosher salt
- 1 tsp black pepper
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp dried thyme

Instructions

- 1. Let roast sit at room temperature for 45 minutes. Preheat oven to 450°F (230°C).
- 2. Rub roast with olive oil and season with salt, pepper, garlic, and thyme.
- 3. Place roast fat-side up on a rack in a roasting pan.
- 4. Roast 15 minutes at 450°F, then reduce to 325°F and continue cooking 1½–2 hours (until internal temp is 135°F for medium rare).
- 5. Rest 15 minutes before slicing.



Breakfast Bake

Ingredients

- 6 cups day-old bread cubes
- 1 lb breakfast sausage or cooked ham, chopped
- 1½ cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 cups milk
- 5 eggs
- ½ tsp salt, ¼ tsp pepper
- 2 green onions, sliced

Instructions

- 1. Grease a 9x13-inch baking dish. Layer bread, sausage, and cheese.
- 2. Whisk milk, eggs, salt, and pepper. Pour evenly over mixture.
- 3. Sprinkle with green onions.
- 4. Cover and refrigerate overnight (optional).
- 5. Bake uncovered at 350°F (175°C) for 40–45 minutes until golden and set in the centre.
